# Lighthouse site now open to public! Come celebrate on July 13 and August 18!

After nine years of petitions, negotiations and planning, the Ville de Métis-sur-Mer, the Association des residents de la pointe du phare (ARPP) and Heritage Lower St. Lawrence are pleased to announce that the site of the Pointe-Mitis Lighthouse is now open on a daily basis to visitors. Certain restrictions will, however, apply. The most important is that parking will be restricted to the part of Route du phare near Route 132 to reduce vehicular traffic and maintain the tranquil nature of this neighbourhood. A short and pleasant walk of 15 minutes is thus required to get to the lighthouse site. In addition, visiting hours will also be limited from 9:00 AM to 5:00 PM to provide a degree of privacy to those renting facilities at the site. Rental income is a key to the business plan for the site and will depend on renting both the keeper's house and the foghorn building to private individuals and organisations during the summer. This revenue is essential for the maintenance and renovations of the site and buildings.

To celebrate the opening of the site, the ARPP will host an open-house on July 13, Quebec Light-house Day, at the site. Activities will include tours of the buildings, talks on the past history of the

site and future plans for its use. Birthday cake will be provided to celebrate the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the construction of the foghorn building (see photo) as well as the 110<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the construction of the lighthouse. Shuttle service to the site will be provided from the village.

The ARPP will also host its annual community picnic at the light-house site on August 18 with exhibits on marine life and shore-line plants. A special lecture on Québec seabirds will also be presented by Dr. Laura McKinnon. Shuttle service to the site will again be provided from the village.

The ARPP is a not-for-profit organization of volunteers dedicated to guiding the development and preservation of the Pointe-Mitis Lighthouse site. Last fall, the ARPP signed a 15-year lease with the Ville de Métis-sur-Mer to manage and restore the lighthouse site after decades of neglect. ## How an Intergenerational Community-based Art Project Impacted my Life

Pulled by a chubby hand, I was led to a table supplied with a plethora of colorful beads and tiles of glass. "Can you help me?" this little one asked as he grasped a pile of sparkling golden tiles from their neat container and scattered them into a mess. From my two-feet higher set of eyes, I watched this elementary student salsa dancing in his chair, holding a facial expression I swear to have been the most excited look a child could have, and got lucky to catch a glimpse of childhood wonder. I smiled. From ear to ear. And said "of course! let's do this together."

In the midst of the Lower St. Lawrence stands the teeny, but yet impactful, town and community of Metis Beach. And at the center of this small town lies a gem known as Metis Beach School (my former high school). Over the years, this lively school has proven to serve as an inviting scope for community-building activities, and community projects relating to art have certainly been no exception.

During my graduating year at MBS, I was blessed with the privilege to be taught by mosaic artist, Lisan Chng whom I, at the time, had become greatly inspired by. While working on the project she had hosted, I remember being in a state of awe seeing how full of enthusiasm and passion she had in her marrow for the craft. So, after being informed by my mother that Lisan was going to host yet another community-based project, "Magic Pots and Talking Mirrors", I headed into it with excite. This specific program, sponsored by ELAN (English Language Arts Network-Québec) was set to be an intergenerational mosaic project where adults and children would work alongside each other. Adults on mirrors, and younglings from kindergarten to elementary level on flower pots. Though I must say, even knowing this, I walked in on all this excitement with a completely blind idea of what exactly to expect.

First off, in my spur-of-the-moment decision to join this project, I followed my mum into it not knowing at the time the group's label was preceded by "Senior". As a freshly-turned 18-year-old, discovering I had involved my-self into what was, in fact, a "senior's" group, quickly hit me with a bout of laughter. "I guess I'm just an 'extra Jr. Senior'" I giggled to myself. But shortly after emerging into the unfamiliar group, in both demographic and faces, I was pleased to find that I still found a comfortable spot to fit right in.

Still salsa dancing on-top his chair, my eager little partner squealed "It's sooooo SHINY!!!!!" And soon after, with an opera-singer voice, he sang "like a pot of goldddddd!!!". (What a voice indeed I tell ya). It was while seeing these silly moments, of a now-hopping-around-the-room child simply careless, free and undoubtedly hyperrrr, I discovered within myself that I find an abundance of joy in with working with kids.



Currently, my life motto is to "go with the flow", "follow whatever path is ahead", "take opportunities as they come"... basically, my current life plan is to have no plan. I don't yet know exactly what I want out life, what I want to do or if going to college/university will ever be part of it. So now I've been focusing on trying new things and figuring out what works for me. Anything and everything. Heck, for the past six months I was working in a lobster processing plant, and I discovered it was seriously the absolute best. This project was also the absolute best.

In experiencing the emotional baggage of a recent hardship, you could say my spirit was like a "caged bird" before being granted the opportunities walking in on this whole experience provided me. Of helping little hands, of doing my best to capture precious moments with pictures and with writing this very article. In short, I needed something new to learn, or people new to meet to get me out of my rut. And this project, consisting of the niche community of senior volunteers and young students, along with a wonderful artist host, had created just the environment I needed to spring me back into motion. It was the fun I had designing my mosaic mirror. The new techniques and skills I learned. Speaking with all the wise "senior" ladies I met (who I swear are still so young at heart). And most definitely, It was the kids.

After every session I found myself arriving home pooped, tired, exhausted, hungry, sleepy... and well, you get the point. But at the same time, I was never so empty but yet ever so full of joy and happy energy from the crowd of children who had surrounded me for that past couple of hours. It was something I looked forward to each week. Being utterly pooped. Needing 100 naps. Just seeing those adorable faces and the pieces of our hard work come together. Or not...

As a step of this project, we had to glue beaded patterns the kindergarten students created onto the tops of flower pots. Easy as 1,2,3. right? 1. Apply glue. 2. Stick pattern on. 3. observe completed pro... uh ooh. Pretty pearly pinks and blues and rainbows of colors had started to droop right off the glue, well, the "kamikaze-slide", that had just been slathered on. Shortly after, sort of in a panic, we were forced to observe the un-kind effects of gravity. Not so fun. I'm not lying when I say tears of stress started leaking out of our eyes at the sight. But all the while, Lisan was already coming up with a way to fix our encountered problem -- thicker paste. She's a superwoman, I swear. This is how Lisan somehow managed to inspire me even further. By demonstrating perseverance at its finest! As a bonus, this also served as a learning experience for the younger ones -- sometimes things in life don't quite turn out to plan.

After about two months of trial and error, creativity and plain hard work, everything was complete. A group picture was taken with completed pieces as faces all-a-smiled and everything was cleaned up. (However, I beg to question if grout ever truly leaves any space it dare enters...). It was simply finished. With its bittersweet taste and all. And I could tell I wasn't going to be the only who would feel a little weird about not having to mark the next project dates on the calendar.

"Magic Pots and Talking Mirrors" was a community-based project I won't forget being involved in. I won't forget spotting heads of youngsters and those with strands of white working together with smiles. I won't forget how the loving and eager volunteers, even some who were not at first confident with their ability to work with kids, came in and made it all so much more fun. (They seriously made cutting tape seem like the "fun-est" thing in the world). I won't forget one of my little partners gasping at how SHINY his pot turned out or the what seemed like a hundred hugs and cat drawings I got from the kids for helping them make what they did. They were proud of themselves. I was definitely proud of them. And I certainly won't forget the impact it has had on me as a young adult.

Getting to be a part of something so impactful has both given me more confidence in myself and has shown me a little more of the direction I hope life's current takes me towards. I mean, I still do not know what I would like to do with my life but my biggest takeaway was in discovering teaching children stems from a passion I hadn't yet known I had. They've stolen a place in my heart, and their drawings are still on my fridge to prove it.

Due to the positive outcome I've seen this project have in-close and personal for everyone involved, I hope it will serve as a launch-pad for more intergenerational art-based projects for not only this community but also perhaps those which neighbor, to spring up. Be-

cause hopefully, and just maybe, I believe if opportunities like this would continue to arise, others might be given the same chance to learn something new. About a craft, or even, about themselves. Photos Melissa Landry.

#### **REGULATION #16-99 CONCERNING ANIMALS**



In this regulation it is specified that:

- The owner cannot let dogs roam in a public place or on private property other than that of the owner of the animal;
- Any owner of an animal must remove excrement from the street or in a park, and deposit it in a container or bag.

Be respectful of your neighborhood and tie your dog up.



## INFO-PRÉVENTION

#### BARBECUE SAFETY

Ah! Barbecuing. It adds such enjoyment to summers that are too short.

But don't forget this essential ingredient: safety.

Make sure you have a functional ABC type extinguisher nearby. Always refer to the instruction manual.

#### Where to Install your barbecue.

- Barbecues are approved for outdoor use only. They emit carbon monoxide (CO), a colourless, odourless
  gas that is dangerous in enclosed spaces, and can lead to unconsciousness and even death. For safety reasons, a "rotten eggs" smell is added before the gas is sold. Be alert and avoid explosions!
- Never barbecue in a garage, tent or other enclosed space.
- Always barbecue on a solid, stable surface.
- Keep children and pets at least one metre (three feet) away from a hot BBQ.



## **BARBECUE SAFETY** (continued)

## Taking your barbecue out of storage

At the start of the barbecue season or when you change the propane cylinder, complete this three-step safety check.

- Clean: Use a pipe cleaner or wire to ensure burner parts are free of rust, dirt, spider webs or other debris.
- Check: Examine the hose leading from the tank to the burners. Replace if cracked or damaged.
- Test: Find leaks by applying a 50/50 solution of water and dish soap to propane cylinder connections and hoses. If bubbles appear, tighten the connection and/or replace the damaged parts and retest. Never use matches or lighters to check for leaks. If you have concerns about a leak, contact a qualified service technician.

## Using the barbecue—Follow these steps when igniting a barbecue.



- 1. Open the lid.
- 2. Open the propane cylinder service valve.
- 3. Turn on grill/burner valves or heat settings.
- 4. Take a step back.
- 5. Push the igniter button. If there is no igniter button, insert a long match or barbecue lighter through the side burner hole first, then turn on the heat control knob.
- 6. If the burner does not ignite right away, turn the gas off and wait five minutes, keeping the lid open, before repeating the procedure.

## Follow these steps when you are finished barbecuing.

- 1. Turn the gas valve off first when finished, then turn off the burner controls, so no gas is left in the connecting hose.
- 2. Allow the barbecue to cool completely before closing the lid or covering.
- 3. If you have a charcoal barbecue, make sure the charcoal has cooled down completely before you get rid of it. This could take several hours.

#### Storage

- Store the tank outside (winter and summer), upright, out of reach of children.
- Make sure the tanks are protected from shocks, away from the sun and any other source of heat.

## If your barbecue catches fire

- Don't throw water on a grease fire. This will only spread the flame.
- If the gas valve is accessible, close it.
- If not, immediately evacuate the area and call 911.
- Have the barbecue inspected by a professional before using it again.

Take old (10 years +) or defective cylinders to a propane distributor. Do not put them in the garbage or recycling. They can explode even if they seem to be empty.

Hello,

If we can have as much nice weather as we had snow last winter, we should have a great summer! Well, we can't predict the weather but we can at least give you some tips on how to reduce your waste easily at home:

#### · Reduce to the source

Do not create waste unnecessarily, leave your grass clippings on the ground. Cut grass will enrich your soil and keep it moist during periods of drought.

#### Reuse

Before you buy a new bike, garden supplies or tools, consider buying second hand on Kijiji, Brick à Brack, Marketplace, Facebook, ecocentre, thrift shop, etc. The misfortune of some makes the happiness of others!

#### Ecocentre de La Mitis

Before going to the ecocentre to dispose of your construction materials, paints, oils or branches, make sure you sort your materials and attach them securely so you do not lose them on the way.

#### Brown bin

Avoid flies and odors by wrapping your compostable wastes in newspaper or compostable plastic bags and make sure to empty your brown bin every collection.

#### Blue bin

Briefly rinse your containers before disposing of them in the blue bin. Imagine: A pot of mayon-naise simmering 2 weeks in the sun before arriving at the sorting center ... Rinse!

#### Party time

It's so easy to forget to be eco-friendly while having a party, but try to create a habit of reducing at the source, recycle and compost even while having fun. Some examples: Washable or compostable tableware, reusable decorations, zero-waste snack, etc.
