





roles that they all played to receive information from the axis countries they were in, to transmit back to the British intelligence.








Roméo Dallaire, Shake hands with the devil (adult non-fiction)


Adib Khorram, Darius the great is not okay (youth novel)

VACCINATION AGAINST SEASONAL INFLUENZA (FLU VACCINATION)

The regional flu vaccination campaign starts on November 1st.

In Mont-Joli, vaccination clinics will be held on November 6-7-8 and December 12.

In Baie-des-Sables, it will be held on November 13.

CISSS du Bas-Saint-Laurent staff will also be offering the vaccine to residents of long-term and intermediate care facilities, as well as seniors' residences. It is also possible for persons who receive home care services to be vaccinated at home.

The vaccine is free for high-risk individuals:

- People with chronic diseases, from the age of 6 months;
- People aged 75 and over;
- Pregnant women with certain chronic diseases, regardless of the stage of pregnancy;
- Pregnant women in good health, during their 2nd or 3rd trimesters;
- Relatives living under the same roof and caregivers of the persons mentioned above and of children under 6 months of age;
- Health care workers, particularly those providing direct care to patients in hospitals and in longterm care facilities (CHSLD);

*This year, children aged 6 to 23 months who are in good health and persons 60-74 years of age can receive the vaccine free of charge upon request even though they are no longer considered at-risk.

Any other person can be vaccinated at his/her own expense.



WINTER IS COMING: HERE ARE FEW ARTICLES ABOUT THE MANAGEMENT OF SNOW (REGULATION # 03-08)

ARTICLE 3: SNOW/ICE

Conforming with articles 498 of the Highway safety code and 415.22 of the Towns and Cities Act, it is a nuisance and is therefore prohibited to throw or dispose of snow or ice from a private property on the streets or yards, on public land, in public parks, in municipal waters or watercourses.

ARTICLE 5: IMPOSSIBILITY OF SNOW BLOWING

If it is impossible to blow the snow on the private property, or if the owner refuses to have the snow blown on his or her property by the municipality, a fee of \$40 (forty dollars) will be charged to said owner, each time snow would have been blown, to pay for the removal and transportation of the snow.

ARTICLE 7: WINTER PARKING

It is forbidden to park or stop a vehicle on the public way between 11:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m., from November 15 to April 15 inclusively, in the territory of the municipality. Offenders will be fined \$30 (thirty dollars) plus administrative and postal fees.

It is also time to install your driveway entrance marker, please make sure that they are installed on your property and not on the public right-of-way.

BEFORE WINTER

It is strongly recommended to install appropriate driveway markers to identify the edge of your property to facilitate snow-clearing operations and minimize the damage that could be caused by the removal of snow. These markers must stay in place until spring. If the markers are removed before, you will be solely responsible for the damage to your property. The municipality will install additional markers in some places.

DUMP FOR BRANCHES AND DEAD LEAVES

Please note that the dump on Station Road will be closed as of the first snow.

- Any owner of an animal must remove excrement from the street or park, and deposit it in a container or bag.



INFO PRÉVENTION

When you turn back your clocks, check your smoke detectors!

With the cold season comes an increased risk of home fires because the heating equipment is a common cause of fatalities. So this winter, keep yourself and your loved-ones protected! When you turn back your clocks as Daylight saving time ends, please take these simple steps:

1. Check all your smoke alarms.

- Replace the batteries in all your smoke alarms and push the test button. If you rely on models with lithium batteries, you won't have to change the batteries, but make sure to push the test button anyway.
- Expose the smoke detector to burning incense or a candle just blown out. Stay at a reasonable distance so as not to damage the device or start a fire!

2. Install smoke alarms to protect all the following areas:

- on each floor, including the basement
- in the corridor, near the bedrooms
- in each bedroom where people sleep with the door closed

Ionization smoke detectors are the most common. They are installed near the bedrooms. Photoelectric smoke detectors are installed near the kitchen, bathrooms and heating appliances.

If you choose a smoke detector with a long-lasting lithium battery, you won't have to change the battery, but please still verify its operation regularly.

Electric smoke detectors can be interconnected. Thus, your security is enhanced because they all initiate an alarm at the same time, regardless of where the fire is located. They should have an emergency battery in case of a power failure.



The ULC logo must appear on the smoke detector, indicating that the device meets Canadian standards.

3. Have an evacuation plan.

Is each occupant familiar with it? Do you perform a yearly evacuation drill? Have you identified an outside meeting point?

These three simple steps could save your life or one of a family member, so please follow them!

CAUTION: Never remove a battery from a smoke detector that triggers alarms too frequently. It is probably located too close to the stove or bathroom. Move it slightly away or get a photoelectric smoke detector instead.

CAUTION: Smoke detectors **do not detect** carbon monoxide (CO) – a deadly gas. If you have carbon monoxide sources in your home (wood stove, oil furnace, built-in garage, etc.), purchase both types of detectors.

And no matter which model you choose, its lifespan is 10 years maximum!

The Green Newsletter - « Is it worth recycling? »

Hello,

Over the last few months, recycling in Quebec has been mistreated, particularly with the overwhelming reports on recycling rates, the refund proposition of the bottles of wine, the committee on the issues of local recycling and valorisation of glass, the committee on the modernization of the recovery and recycling industry, Quebec sorting centers threatening to close and so on. In short, it's normal to end up wondering: Is it worth recycling?

Without a doubt, the answer is: YES.

First, it's important to understand that your materials are recycled. The current crisis is linked to market prices so low that sorting centers needing the sale of those materials to operate are no longer sustainable. The materials are sometimes recycled at loss. This is why we end up with solutions such as using glass as recovery material in landfill sites because it is more profitable in the short term than to modernize the sorting centers in order to obtain better quality and thus to have access to glass recyclers or to more acceptable and more regional solutions. It is on this issue that the committees mentioned above work.

Second, the printing, packaging and containers industry is responsible for the costs of recovery and recycling. As a result, they finance more than 90% of Québec's curbside recycling system compared to waste management where we, as citizens, are the only ones to pay 100% of the costs. Thus, in addition to being more ecological, it is economical to recycle!

Finally, your participation in the recycling system helps divert more than 4,000 tonnes of recyclable material from landfills each year, while creating jobs in the region and being good for the environment. Thank you!
