


Since 2014, local community groups and institutions have been discussing aging in la MRC de la Métis. As well, more than 20 agencies (see diagram) have been meeting four times a year in a discussion group called, « Round Table; Aging in good health », to discuss priorities, major issues, and actions to take to better serve the Mitis senior population.

Arising from the local initiative were four committees focussing on the issues of abuse, leisure, caregivers and communications.

As a result, numerous projects have been undertaken, among which should be noted: the creation of a service and resource guide for seniors*; a guide to help in identifying senior abuse*; the hiring of a community worker for caregivers; the airing of information and awareness messages on television and radio and the hiring of an activities community worker for private seniors' residences. These are some of the projects that were undertaken by the « Table Vieillir » en santé de la Mitis.





MARINE RESCUES AND RESCUERS

The heroics of Friday, September 21 to save two sailors caught in the terrific winds and waves when their boat capsized off Rimouski highlight the perils of navigating on the St. Lawrence. Autumn storms make navigation even more perilous than usual. The water is dangerously cold and can bring hypothermia and death in just minutes.

Commander Ted Savage, a Metis resident, led the Canadian Coast Guard Auxiliary response. He described it as one of the most harrowing rescues of his 12-year career with the auxiliary. CBC Radio described what happened: "For more than an hour, the auxiliary crew struggled to get a line out to the couple to pull them into the boat. Eventually, they managed to hook them both, but a wave thrust the woman so hard she let go and was cast into open waters. [...] He and the crew decided to keep the man aboard their Zodiac since he wasn't injured and was kept dry by his immersion suit, not to lose any of the time they needed to rescue his partner. [...] He and the crew tried to get a line out to her from different positions. After more than two hours, Savage decided to execute a manoeuvre typically reserved for calmer seas. Clouds had broken and a nearly full moon gave him a better idea of the surrounding

obstacles. [...] Jonathan Brunet leaned overboard to grab the woman and pull her into the rescue boat, ending the hours-long operation. He timed his approach to the woman so the waves would allow for the boat to tilt toward her and give crew member Jonathan Brunet just enough time to reach out and grab her while the other men held on to him. "She was great. She just intrinsically knew what we were trying to do," Savage said. "She never, ever gave up. [...] Not everything worked out the way it was supposed to, but at the end, nobody got hurt and nobody died, and that's a great outcome. And we're pretty happy about that."

Sailing and cargo ships have frequented the waters near Metis for centuries. Gilbert Bossé has carefully chronicled the many wrecks in the region in the 19th century. Shipwreck hunter Samuel Côté has pinpointed their exact location with the help of the sophisticated surveys done by the Canadian Hydrographic Service. Many Metisians have witnessed wrecks from the shoreline and come to the aid of sailors once they have made their way to shore. Some have also had the courage to come to the assistance of mariners to rescue them in open water.

Alice Sharples Baldwin lived through the wreck of the Idrija, a Yugoslavian vessel that lost engine power off Metis in October 1975. In her book "Metis – wee Scotland of the Gaspé", she told the story of the community's efforts to offer the sailors shelter and sustenance: Crédit photos: Stéphanie Pépin

The Wreck of the *Idrija*Well done, Metis

The morning of Sunday, Oct. 10th, 1976 – Thanksgiving Day Weekend – dawned stormy and cold the wind was wild and the waves high. Early Risers, Breakfast-Getters, Hunters, Mass-Goers and Joggers looking casually out to sea, stopped dead, rubbed their eyes or the window pane, incredulously looked a second time. Apparently directly before them, not more than a mile off shore lay a large vessel seemingly in flames – there was a rush for binoculars; scantily-clad seamen could be seen lining the deck and attempting to signal Distress. The vessel proved to be the Yugoslavian Bulk Carrier M.B. *Idrija*, bound for Baie-Comeau to pick up a load of wheat. The bad weather had driven her from the harbour. Then fire had broken out at 0100 hrs, resisting all efforts to control it; the radio then went out of commission. At six o'clock the engines had stopped – Dropping both anchors, the crew found themselves 600 feet west of Metis Lighthouse. They knew nothing of the Canadian Thanksgiving but they had a cause for thanks; in the course of an ordinary week, few watchers might have been found along the shore.

Now calls poured in to the Police at Rimouski and Matane, to Mayor Rousseau, to the Metis Volunteer Fire Brigade. From all accounts, the rescue was organized with speed and efficiency but the time seemed endless – ghosts of the unhappy ships wrecked on those same reefs, in that same icy water, at the same season of the year; the *Ocean*, the *Amanda*, the *Laurel* and the *Montmorency*, came to haunt the anxious watchers from the shore.

Then the situation clarified: the Security Police would take the men from the vessel by helicopter, two at a time to the Metis School. The yard afforded landing space and shelter and warmth would be immediately available to the sailors, who had been firefighting mostly half clothed throughout the night.

Despite high seas and fierce winds, the crew of thirty-four were successfully air-lifted from the ship to the school – a few suffering from superficial burns and smoke inhalation – all exhausted. Here clothing was waiting for them. The resourceful Metis women had

canvassed the village for men's wear. One source of supply was the Town Hall where a rummage sale had recently taken place and the men's clothing had not been in great demand. When the supply of shoes gave out, Mme Leblond of Les Boules opened her shop and produced footwear... Visitors helped where they could.

Mrs. Winnie Turriff writes that although they were "chilled to the bone" and tired, the men "took time to select the best fit they could find and something that suited their taste" discarding sweaters or shirts that did not match. One man now wearing blue and grey checked trousers with a blue sweater and grey jacket was delighted with his appearance..." Soon all the refugees were better dressed than the townspeople gathered at the school"...

[...] Edith Turriff and her sisters-in-law and other members of the family arrived at the school with thirty-four dinners containing roast turkey, dressing, vegetables, cranberry sauce, etc., individually packaged in foil dishes! They were followed by several kinds of pie... "I don't believe" writes Winnie (Mrs. Lorne) Turriff – "that we ever enjoyed a dinner more than this one that was eaten by someone else"...

Following this memorable meal the sailors slept exhausted on the floor of the schoolroom, in a circle, feet to feet.

COOKING FIRES

In Quebec, almost one-third of residential building fires begin in the kitchen.
These fires are mostly caused by human errors, distractions, etc.
In addition to burns, heavy human and material losses result.
Many unfortunate events can be avoided by simple preventive actions.

HOW TO PREVENT COOKING FIRES

Turn off cooking appliances when you have to leave the kitchen or your home;

- Do not store objects in the oven or on the top of the range;
- Keep a portable fire extinguisher handy, a few meters away from the stove, for example at the kitchen entrance, and learn how to use it;
- Keep paper or plastic items and fabrics away from heating elements;
- Keep oven mitts, in good condition, handy, but at a distance from the heating elements;
- Regularly clean the cooking appliances and the range hood. An accumulation of grease represents a danger of fire:
 - If you own a self-cleaning oven, clean regularly;
 - Do not use the self-cleaning function if a lot of residue has accumulated at the bottom of the oven. It could ignite since the temperature during cleaning can easily rise above 480 ° C (900 ° F);
 - Regularly clean the containers under the electrical elements of the range;
 - Clean the inside of the stove hood and the outside. The accumulation of greasy residue can catch fire.

NEVER use a saucepan to deep-fry your food. Always use a CSA or ULC certified fryer with a thermostat for deep-frying your food. Always read the instructions for your device before use. Heat the oil slowly and turn off the fryer immediately after cooking.

WHAT CAN YOU DO IF THERE'S A FIRE ON THE STOVE?

- Never move a container whose contents are in flames;
- Put out the fire by placing a lid of the appropriate size on the container. Use an oven mitten to place the lid on the container because the steam or flames can burn you badly;
- If possible, turn off the heating elements, including those in the oven;
- Close the kitchen hood;
- Call the fire department, even if the fire seems to be out. The latter could have infiltrated into the duct of the hood;
- If the fire is out, but there is smoke build-up, open windows and doors to ventilate and evacuate your home;
- If the fire spreads, close the windows and doors quickly if you have time, then quickly evacuate your home and call 911;
- Replace or have your range inspected before reuse after a fire. Do so for any other cooking appliance.



NOTICE TO ALL THE TAXPAYERS OF MÉTIS-SUR-MER SALE FOR NON-PAYMENT OF MUNICIPAL TAXES

As stipulated in the Cities and Towns Act, section VI, article 511, after the expiration of the six month period following the date of the notice of the deposit of the collection role, the Treasurer shall draw up a statement indicating the buildings on which the taxes imposed have not been paid, in whole or in part. However, for several years, the Council of Métis-sur-Mer has been giving a two years grace period to pay municipal taxes. Now the Council wants the procedure to be standardized, that is, the taxes at 31st of December of the year before the current year must be paid. If you have any questions, do not hesitate to contact the municipal office.

The Green Newsletter - October 2018 - « 3 good ways to deal with your fallen leaves »

Hello,

Many of you know that disposing of your fallen leaves in the trash can have a negative impact on the environment. Buried, their decomposition takes place under conditions that transform them into methane, a greenhouse gas responsible for climate change up to 25 times more powerful than carbon dioxide! Thus, here are the best ways to dispose of your fallen leaves properly and in respect of the environment:

1 – Leave the fallen leaves on your yard

Let nature do what it has always done by allowing the nutrients in the leaves to return to the soil and feed the tree in the spring, without any effort at all! It is the ecological, economical and efficient solution. If you have a lot of leaves, shred them with the mower to prevent them from choking your lawn. Your fallen leaves can also serve as protection on your garden and your flower beds.

2 – The Ecocentre or municipal special collection

Sometimes the quantity of leaves is too great and to dispose of them elsewhere becomes necessary. Your Ecocentre will welcome these leaves as early as October. Otherwise, ask your municipality if door-to-door collection is available

3 – Store some carbon materials for your backyard compost

If you do backyard composting at home, storing fallen leaves will allow you to have a supply of carbon material for the year. Do not forget to make holes in your bags to allow them to breathe!
