expectations. The sewing team, Diane Dubois and Nathalie Brochu, have made some 1400 masks in a wide variety of fun prints like penguins, lighthouses, ladybugs and donuts



over the past 6 weeks. They have received orders from Metis, Mont-Joli, Rimouski, Montréal and even outside the province. What a success! They have already completely sold out. All the profits have been donated to the Virtual Fridge which delivers food baskets to local families and residents in need due to the COVID-19 crisis. Three Cheers go out to the initiators and volunteers.



Jessie Burton, *The Miniaturist* (adult novel)

Recommended by Catherine Beauchemin

On an autumn day in 1686, eighteen-year-old Nella Oortman knocks at the door of

a grand house in the wealthiest quarter of Amsterdam. She has come from the country to begin a new life as the wife of the illustrious merchant trader Johannes Brandt, but instead she is met by his sharp-tongued sister, Marin. Only later does Johannes appear and present her with an extraordinary wedding gift: a cabinet-sized replica of their home. It is to be furnished by an elusive miniaturist, whose tiny creations mirror their real-life counterparts in unexpected ways...

After living in Holland for a few years, it seems that part of my heart will remain Dutch for good. To this day, I have been irresistibly drawn to any story that takes place in the Netherlands and this book is no exception. I enjoyed the details about Amsterdam, almost as if I could be there walking in the streets again (except for the fact that it's set in the seventeenth century)!



Lighthouse site remains accessible



Spring seems to have arrived at Lighthouse Point with the snow finally disappearing. Although there were some visitors to the lighthouse throughout the winter, one no longer needs snowshoes to get there – just any old shoes or a bicycle will do. And the good news is that in these trying times, this place of tranquility will remain open to the public, but only as long as municipal and provincial health guidelines are respected and visitors follow rules regarding access and allowable activities at the site.




Foremost among these rules is that the site is only accessible by walking or cycling from the parking area near Route 132 (approximately 1 km). This lovely stroll passes through the charming neighborhood of Lighthouse Point and is very much part of the experience. We are also pleased to announce that our association and the Ville de Métis-sur-Mer, in cooperation with a local property owner, have developed a small parking area reversed for visitors. As always, the site is open every day from 9 to 5.

There have also been improvements at the site including renovations to the interior of the Keeper's House and the installation of underground water tanks for collecting and storing rainwater. Unfortunately, the outside work has left the site looking like a construction site, but plans are underway for turning the piles of rocks and dirt into flowerbeds and other landscaping. Indeed, we may be looking for volunteers so please contact Ladd Johnson (laddjohnson@pharemetislighthouse.org) for more information.

Sadly, with the current restrictions on social gatherings, it is unlikely that any events, including Lighthouse Day and the annual ARPP community picnic, will be held this summer. We will, however, keep you informed of any changes.

Finally, efforts are continuing to restore the light, but we are still waiting on news from our grant application, which has been delayed due to the current crisis. However, even if we get good news in that regard, work cannot be done until 2021 as the company involved cannot commit to work this year. A shame because if we ever needed the light to comfort and inspire us, now is the time.



I am rarely without words, but I must admit that there are no words to really express all the gratitude I have for these two extraordinary women and for all that they have done. 
Shore Clean-up Event in Métis-sur-Mer — Spring 2020

Meet Bruno Leblanc, owner of the Dépanneur Métis-sur-Mer

Bruno Leblanc and Nathalie Isabel were aware of the importance of a gas station/ convenience store in the community of Métis-sur-Mer long before they became owners in 2017. Having worked for several years in the metal and mining industries, one wonders why Bruno opted for such a big career change. But actually, it was more like a return to his roots for him, since his parents were both storekeepers and at the age of 12, his first job was pump attendant at the Shell station in Sainte-Flavie.

When they took over the business, it was in an effort to maintain this essential service in town, while making excellent customer service his priority and increasing the variety of regional products available. From quick snacks to frozen meals, you will find a wide selection of microbrewery beers, as well as products from Épicerie-Boucherie R. St-Gelais, Les Fumoirs Raoul Roux and La Fumerie de l'Est.


With the onset of the pandemic, some adjustments had to be made to meet the new health standards requirements, but most importantly, to meet the needs of the population. Concerned about people in confinement, he increased the availability of fresh products such as fruits and vegetables and introduced a free delivery service.

Firmly rooted in its community, the company remains open year-round and has one permanent full-time employee and three part-time employees. The dual vocation of the gas station/convenience store attracts a lot of tourists during the summer season, who inevitably comment on the breathtaking view behind the store.

Since acquiring the business in 2017, Bruno and Nathalie have drawn their motivation from the great complicity they have developed with their clientele. It is their customers' satisfaction that encourages them to keep improving their offering and services. For the years to come, the owners have several plans to improve their business.

PREVENTING INFECTIONS: It's a collective responsibility

Gatherings during the COVID-19 pandemic


Since May 22, outdoor gatherings are permitted provided that specific measures are respected.

First, not more than 10 people must be present at a gathering. Also, they should include people from a maximum of three households. As a reminder, those people living at the same address form a household.

Obviously, a distance of at least 2 metres must be kept between those people who are not from the same household.

The use of a face covering is strongly recommended.

CHANGES ASSOCIATED

WITH COVID-19

- In this pandemic context, **new procedures are available for the use of community gardens** on the website of the Town or at the municipal office.
- Usually *la fête des bénévoles et des nouveaux arrivants* is organized by the Town on the first Saturday of June. During the pandemic, the Town must postpone this event until later. Thank you.
- Métis-sur-Mer Council meetings held behind closed doors until further notice.
- Considering that there are several citizens whose financial situation could become precarious as a result of COVID-19, the Town of Métis-sur-Mer wishes to help these taxpayers by lowering the interest rate applicable to any debt owed to it on the first tax payment of March 19, 2020 and also on the second payment of taxes on June 11, 2020. Therefore, the interest rate applicable to any unpaid money to the City of Métis-sur-Mer, on the first tax payment of March 19, 2020 and on the second tax payment of June 11, 2020, until June 30, 2020 is set at 0% per year. This interest rate applies until July 1, midnight, 2020 and will be restored to 10% after that period. It should be noted that the due dates have not been changed, so for those who can, please respect the deadlines.

In 2020, the Town of Métis-sur-Mer has decided to involve its citizens in certain areas of municipal management. BY-LAW #20-145 AMENDING REGULATION 16-99 FOR ANIMALS AT MÉTIS-SUR-MER

PUBLIC NOTICE is hereby given by the undersigned, Stéphane Marcheterre, Director General and secretary treasurer that the municipal council of Métis-sur-Mer adopted, on May 4th, 2020, By-law #20-145 amending regulation 16-99 for animals at Métis-sur-Mer. Any interested party may consult the said By-Law at the office of the Municipality.

This By-Law comes into effect in accordance with the Law.

Act to promote the protection of persons by establishing a framework with regard to dogs.

In order to register your dog, you can print the form on the Town's web site or come at the municipal office. Fill it out and bring it to the office with your payment. At this moment, you can choose your medal. Thank you. The office has been open to the public since May 5.



REGULATION CONCERNING ANIMALS

In this regulation it is specified that:

- The owner cannot let dogs roam in a public place or private property other than that of the owner of the animal;
- Any owner of an animal, in a street or a park, must remove excrement and deposit them in a container or bag.



Info-prévention

SAFE USE OF BARBECUES



Cooking on the barbecue is one of Quebecers' favorite summer activities.

But don't forget one essential ingredient: safety!

Where to install it?

- Always outside. Insufficient ventilation can lead to carbon monoxide poisoning (a colorless and odorless gas that can be deadly).
- On a solid surface, away from play areas.
- At least at 1 meter from the wall or any combustible element (shrubs, hedges, etc.).

Before the first use or when changing the tank:

- Spray the fittings with soapy water. If bubbles form when opening the gas, there is a leak: have defective parts replaced before using your barbecue.

To turn it on:

- Open one of the gas control buttons.
- While avoiding leaning over the appliance, activate the integrated igniter (maximum 2 times) or insert a lighter with a long spout or a long match in the orifice near the burner concerned.

WARNING:

- If your barbecue does not light up right away, close the gas control and allow the appliance to ventilate completely before trying again. Several minutes may be necessary.
- A smell reminding of rotten eggs is added to propane to facilitate the detection of leaks. Be alert to avoid the risk of explosion!

Never leave a functioning BBQ unattended.

To turn it off:

- Close the tap on the propane tank. The gas in the pipes will escape and burn completely.
- When the flame is out, close all gas controls.
- Close the barbecue cover.

Storage

- Store the tank outdoors (summer and winter), in an upright position, out of the reach of children.
- Make sure it is protected from shocks, direct sunlight or any other source of heat.

If the barbecue catches fire:

- Evacuate immediately
- Contact emergency services (9-1-1)
- If the tap on the gas tank is accessible without danger, close it.
- Have the barbecue inspected by a professional before using it again.

Replace defective or older tanks by taking them back to the propane distributor. Do not throw them in the garbage, as they may explode even if they appear empty.

If necessary, refer to the instruction manual.

The Green Newsletter - « The compost recipe at home »

Hello,

Do you want a free, natural fertilizer right in your yard? You can make your own compost at home. Compost is a great way to improve soil quality, retain water in the soil, and provide nutrients to plants. You can use it in your flower beds, your garden or on your grass. Home composting can easily be done. In addition, you can use the municipal organic waste collection to put what you can't put in your home compost bin, or you can use your brown bin in winter and home composting in summer. Everything you need is nearby:

- **Green matter** is the moist matter, rich in nitrogen. This is what you find in your kitchen: leftover fruit and vegetables, peels, eggshells, or in your garden: wilted flowers, gardening residue that is not in seed.
- **Brown matter** is the dry matter, rich in carbon. This can be dead leaves, dried grass, newspaper, egg container, brown paper, etc. It is better to shred these materials. You can even make a reserve of shredded dead leaves to have them when necessary.
- Things not to put in: meat, bones, dairy products, fats and oils, seafood, animal excrement and litter.

Regardless of the compost bin used, it is important that the bottom rest directly on the ground to have access to the microorganisms necessary for the process. The optimal conditions for your compost bin are on a well-drained soil, without water accumulation, not too windy, semi-sunny and easily accessible. Start with a good layer of brown matter (twigs or shredded dead leaves) and then add the green matter alternately. The idea is to have a ratio of one amount of green matter for two amounts of brown matter. Then, mix your compost once a week or every two weeks, as needed.

A well-balanced compost will not generate odor and will not attract vermin. By squeezing the compost in your hand, a few drops of water should run between your fingers. If a lot of water comes out when squeezing the compost is too wet. You can then add brown matter and aerate it. If, on the other hand, the compost is very dry, you can cover and water it.
